The rise and rise of the self-employed

LONDON: Record numbers of Britons are turning to self employment and freelancing to find work, and as a result are setting up their own businesses, according to Freelancer.co.uk, the world's largest outsourcing and crowdsourcing marketplace.

Freelancer.co.uk has seen a massive rise of more than 300% in the number of self-employed users registering on its site.

Freelancer.co.uk figures also show a 64% rise in earnings from the self-employed using the site in the first two months of 2012, compared with the first two months of 2011.

Freelancer.co.uk figures also reveal another rising trend that more than a third of those registering will set up their own business and start employing other people to work for them.
